

MACURH Educational Session Explainer + Rubric

All schools are required to submit one active educational session and one passive education session.

Active: Live presentation and activity either 20 or 40 minutes in length.

Passive: Visual board (16x9 – standard size of PowerPoint/Google Slides) of program details. Information should include, but isn't limited to program title, description, budget, supplies, and steps to host.

Active Educational Session Categories

Community, Identity, and Belonging Development

Sessions in this category will be centered around building a healthy community where residents have the opportunity to grow individually and collectively.

Potential topics include:

- *Inclusive Community Building (promoting equity and inclusion)*
- *Identity Development (understanding personally held identities, intersectionality, self-esteem)*
- *Community Engagement (resident participation, service learning, community advocacy)*
- *Leadership Development (leadership skills, empowerment, mentorship)*
- *Impact & Sustainability (measurable outcomes, initiative sustainability, lessons learned)*

Old School Spirit in the New Era

Sessions in this category will be centered around developing 21st century communities in ways that blend traditional strategies and meet modern needs.

Potential topics include:

- *Modernizing Traditions (adapting to change, inclusive traditions, technology integration)*

- *Community Building (shared experiences, inclusive events, contributing positively to campus culture)*
- *Leadership Development (student empowerment, seeking and creating opportunities)*
- *Incorporating technology? (connecting virtually, online resources)*
- *The 21st century student (supporting mental health, career development)*

Old School Leaders of Tomorrow

Sessions in this category will be centered around the character skills required to be a modern leader that aids in the development of modern students.

Potential topics include:

- *Revisiting classic leadership principles (timeless leadership skills/theories)*
- *Historical Figures (impactful leaders, set of overlapping traits)*
- *Emerging Challenges (what are new challenges facing leaders today?)*
- *Inspire & Motivate (building excitement in res hall leadership)*
